State Legislative Committees Act on CHAPA Priority Bills

On February 7, or <u>Joint Rule 10 Day</u>, committees were required to take action on bills that had been referred to them for consideration. Several of <u>CHAPA's priority bills</u> received favorable reports, including <u>The Office of Fair Housing</u>, <u>Eviction Records Sealing</u>, <u>Access to Counsel</u>, <u>Codification of the Massachusetts Rental Voucher Program</u>, <u>The Supportive Housing Pool Program</u>, and <u>The Healthy Homes Initiative</u>. The Joint Committee on Housing also requested an extension until April 18 to act on <u>dozens of other bills</u>, many of which may be considered as part of the Affordable Homes Act.

Unfortunately, there are indications that the proposals being considered would underfund HUD and threaten housing and homelessness programs like federal rental assistance, including Section 8 vouchers. Contact your members of Congress and demand they help address the housing and homelessness crisis by enacting an FY24 spending bill with significant increases for affordable housing and homelessness programs.

Federal Housing Credits Included in House Tax Bill

On January 31, the House of Representatives passed HR 7024, the Tax Relief for American Families and Workers Act of 2024. This legislation includes several provisions that will directly support affordable housing production. The bill is now in the Senate waiting to be put to a vote while advocates urge leadership to bring it directly to the floor rather than sending it to committee first. Boston Indicators Report Highlights Immigrants' Role in Region's Economy

Boston Indicators report, Global Greater Boston:







Immigrants in a Changing Region, depicts the impact of high housing costs, which drive immigrant populations out of Boston and to suburbs like Revere (11% increase in foreign-born population), Boxborough (9% increase), Marlborough (8% increase), and Brockton (8% increase) while Boston and inner-ring suburbs saw much smaller increases.

Report Estimates Economic Impact of Affordable Homes Act Over Next 5 Years

Commissioned by EOHLC, the UMass Donahue Institute's report estimates the economic impact of the Affordable Homes Act over five years at nearly \$15.1 billion, with spending allocated across construction (\$9.7 billion), soft costs (\$2.3 billion), finance (\$1 billion), and maintenance (\$511 million), making up 89% of the total, with the remainder for land acquisition and loan repayment.
